## Sportsmanship Code

(AN EDITORIAL)

The Southwest Conference has adopted a new Sportsmanship Code that is designed to foster better athletic relations between the different schools of that conference.

This new code lays out a plan of conduct for the home students, visiting students, players, and fans in general.

Since it is a code and not a law with any authority to back it up there is nothing to make any one abide by it but human decency. And that should be enough to make it iron-clad.

The SWC Sportsmanship Code is as follows:

I. Team  
A. Each member of the team shall:  
1. Participate in the contest to the best of his ability, abiding by fair and proper means of conduct determined by the rules of the contest.

2. Treat contest officials with due respect and courtesy and shall accept the official's decision in good spirit.

3. Accept victory or defeat in a gracious manner.

II. Student Body  
A. Pre-Game Courtesy

1. The Host School shall:  
a. Write a letter to the visiting school and team prior to the game. This letter should be publicized during the week prior to game in the visiting school's paper. Letter should list the activities of weekend, i. e. banquets, dances, and receptions.

b. Provide receptions and directions for visiting students and team.

c. Provide a means of information — booths or ushers to provide information about tickets, sections, seating, etc.

B. Game Courtesy

1. There shall be cooperation between yell leaders, band, other student organizations and student bodies, i.e. yell leaders cheers will not coincide, and student bodies will not yell while teams are in a huddle or calling signals.

2. The student bodies shall avoid misconduct such as fighting and overt demonstrations, use of intoxicating drinks, disrespect and discourtesy toward teams and officials, and general discourtesies during the half-time period.

C. Post-Game Courtesy

1. Each student body shall demonstrate:

a. Respect for both teams after game.

b. Respect to each other and to spectators.

c. Mutual respect for school songs whenever they are played.

A project for a better student-faculty understanding is being sponsored by San Angelo College, under the direction of Harold F. Bright, registrar.

Each faculty member has been furnished with 25 schedule cards of students in their classes, and will personally interview each student to try to find out what their reactions to academic and social situations are. Student comment is invited by the instructors.

The survey is being conducted in such a manner that the student is urged to express his true feelings and attitudes.

The student will be enlightened on some of the difficulties that the instructor is confronted with, and the program should accomplish various other achievements toward friendly feelings, Mr. Bright said.

## Schuch And Westerman Elected To High Posts At State Home Ec Club Meeting



## Bad Breaks And No Scoring Punch Knock Rams Out Of Title Race

The Rams got knocked out of the title race Saturday night by the Kilgore Rangers by a score of 20 to 0. But the score didn't tell the full story of the conflict.

SAC's team really played rings around the Kilgore bunch but bad breaks and the lack of a scoring punch handicapped the Rams. It seemed that every time the Rams started threatening, either a fumble or something would happen to break up the goalward march.

Kilgore scored all of their points in the first half and the Rams threatened time and again but never could quite make it.

San Angelo's small but rugged line carried the battle to the heavier Ranger line and handled them at will. Every boy in the line did a fine job on both defense and offense. They held the Kilgore backs to a meager 142 yards rushing, while their own backs were running up 208 yards and passing for 92 more.

The first Kilgore score came after a Ram fumble on the 18 yard line. Chancey carried to the three and then Dill moved the ball into pay dirt with Ashley making the conversion.

The Rangers' next score came when Sam Pogue, Kilgore center, caught a SAC fumble on the 18 and went over unhindered. Ashley again kicked the point to make it 10 to 0.

Their final score came on a long pass from the 40 from Chancey to Liscomb, standing in the end zone. This time Ashley failed to convert.

The Rams' most serious threat came in the fading minutes of the first half as they drove down to the five yard line. From there Bobby Zetzman circled left end and appeared to have gone over but the officials ruled him out of bounds on the one foot line. On the next play McWilliams kept the ball and tried over tackle but didn't quite make it as the half ended.

Ram back "Randy" Owens made the most spectacular run of the game when he took the ball around his own right end from the 23 and raced 46 yards down to the Ranger 31, where he was hauled down from behind.

The Rams had the Rangers bested in statistics with 14 first downs to 10, and 208 yards rushing to Kilgore's 142. Passing showed 96 yards for SAC to 84 for the East Texans.

## Hope Blasted For Championship Tie

The 20-0 beating handed the local Rams last Saturday night at Kilgore eliminated the Rams from any hopes of a tie for the championship of SWJCC. Kilgore, with only one game to play, has lost no games, while the Rams have lost two. Tyler's Apaches, however, still maintain a crack at half of the title in the event that Paris - Kilgore's next opponent - should trip the Rangers.

The Rams outgained the Rangers at Kilgore and fought a good fight, but the breaks were against them.

Other games concerning SWJCC teams played last week included: Paris 14, NTAC 8; Lamar 18, Schreiner 6; and Tyler 10, McNeese, La. 7 (non-conference).

This week's schedule has NTAC at John Tarleton Friday and Schreiner at Tyler Saturday.
