## Election And Run-Off Names Three Top SAC Favorites

San Angelo College students last week chose three persons as top college favorites.

They are Paul (Buddy) Horne, freshman of Lohn, Mr. SAC; Rosemary Wilhelm, sophomore of Comanche, Miss SAC; and Dawn Williams, freshman of San Angelo, Rambouillet Queen.

The election left Horne undisputed holder of the Mr. SAC title and four girls in a tie for the other two positions. Run-off elections were held between Miss Wilhelm and Robbie Blackman, freshman of Sterling City for Miss SAC and between Miss Wilhelm and Ann Erwin, freshman of Ballinger, for Rambouillet Queen.

### Picture In Annual

Each of the favorites will have a full page picture in the Rambouillet, college annual.

Miss Williams is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest L. Williams of 2426 Waco. She is a graduate of San Angelo High School where she was active in Student Council work for three years and served as parliamentarian of the organization her senior year.

She was secretary of the Footlighters, a dramatics club, and a member of the club's council during her sophomore year. She was a district winner in declamation during her sophomore year and won first place in original oratory the same year at a Sonora speech meet.

At SAC she is majoring in interior design and plans to attend Texas State College for Women at Denton following graduation. She is president of Sigma Alpha Chi, social club, and is a member of the Assembly Committee.

She is active in the Baptist Student Union and says her hobbies are drawing and playing the piano.

### Comanche Grad

Miss Wilhelm is a graduate of Comanche High School and lives in Carr Hall at the college. She served as president of Carr Hall last year and was elected All-Around Freshman Girl and Queen of Hearts at the Valentine Ball last year.

She is a journalism major and was co-editor of the Rambouillet during the fall semester this year. She is a past president of Sigma Alpha Chi and now is president of the Ramettes.

She is employed in the public relations department of General Telephone Co. of the Southwest.

Horne is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Horne and graduated from Lohn High School where he was a football star and outstanding basketball player.

### Other Nominees

The Student Council sponsors the favorite election. A person is nominated by petition from at least twenty students. The petitions are turned in to the Dean's office several days before the election and ballots are run off. Students must present their activity tickets to be able to vote. Others nominated were John Blocker and Wayne McClure for Mr. SAC, Sherwin Nance for Rambouillet Queen, and Jeanette Todd for Miss SAC.

Classes will hold meetings Friday to elect three boys and three girls from each class to complete the favorite section of the annual.




A New York critic stated that Miss Russell is a satiric singer capable of "reducing her audience to near hysteria."

# Rams Take Pioneer Championship

The San Angelo College Rams and their coach, Phil George, wound up their 1953-54 basketball season in grand style, Saturday night by defeating the Schreiner Institute Mountaineers 81-74 here.

Led by Tom Milford and Bill Barker, with 28 and 27 points respectively, the new Pioneer Conference champs were hard pressed until the latter stages of the fourth period.

The victory enabled the SACsters to end the regular season with a perfect record in conference play, eight consecutive wins.

### Rams To Tournament

However, the Rams still have more games, as they have accepted an invitation to compete in the Region 5 National Junior College Tournament at Amarillo March 4-6. The winner of this tourney advances to the national finals at Hutchinson, Kansas.

However, the Rams will be playing without the services of Jack Webb and Tom Milford in the above tournament, as both have seen three years of college basketball, and under the National Junior College Assn. rules, this makes these two fine competitors ineligible.

Milford closed out his basketball career with SAC after scoring a total of 28 points against Schreiner. His brilliant showing against the Mountaineers brought his season scoring to 481 points, good for second place on the Ram team.

### 20th Win

The win was number 20 in 25 starts for SAC, and gave the Rams the distinction of not having been defeated on the home court this year.

The San Angelo College Ram cagers swatted Arlington State College 89-77 in a thrill-a-minute basketball contest at Arlington Feb. 23 to bring the Rams' conference wins to seven straight.

The Arlington Rebels were not easily overcome, and every point came by "sweat and blood" for the SACsters. Bill Barker and Tom Milford really gained the landslide points of the game for San Angelo in the last quarter. Tom was high point man of the game with 29 points scored in his favor. Tom took runnerup honors with 21 points.

Actually the game sported a see-saw battle up to the latter part of the third quarter, with SAC and the Rebels alternating leads.

Hubert Lange did an outstanding job of taking the ball from the backboards, and also wound up with 17 points of the Ram score to his credit. The 89 point total for the game kept the Rams' average at 90 points per game in seven conference tilts.

The Rams cinched the Pioneer Conference championship Feb. 20 when Schreiner beat Arlington.

## Manitzas Attends State Demo Meet

Frank Steve Manitzas, president of the Tom Green County Young Democratic Club, recently attended the state convention of the organization in Mineral Wells. The convention was billed as a peace-making session between two warring factions of the organization. Three governors were featured as speakers.

Governor Allen Shivers of Texas, Frank Clement of Tennessee, and Johnston Murray of Oklahoma spoke to the Young Democrats in their Thursday, Friday, and Saturday sessions. Others who spoke to the group included John Ben Sheppard, Texas Attorney General; Bill Wilson, Texas Supreme Court Justice; State Senator Searcy Tracewell of Houston; Mrs. Dorothy Gurley, state legislator from Del Rio; and various national and state officials of the Young Democrats.

Two factions of the Texas Young Demos have been tiffing for the past three years. One group, headed in Austin, is loyal to Governor Allen Shivers. The other, headed in San Antonio, calls itself the liberal portion of the party. Since the groups were quarrelling, neither was recognized at the last national convention. To avoid such trouble in the future, the groups worked out their differences at the convention in Mineral Wells. They now present a united front.

The San Angelo Young Demos, though not stating their side in the controversy, tended to sympathize with the pro-Shivers group. John Rutherford, local club secretary; Anne Edmond and Lester Brooks, SACsters, were chosen as alternates.

## Schreiner Plays Santa To Rams

Schreiner Institute, deep in the cellar of the Pioneer Conference cage race, rose like a haunting ghost to put the finger on two teams Feb. 20: Arlington State and San Angelo College.

Schreiner defeated Arlington State, 75-66, to knock the Rebels from a try at their third consecutive league championship and at the same time gave the conference crown to the San Angelo Rams.

The Rams were playing a non-conference game that night which they won over Hardin-Simmons frosh, 94-73

The Concho Aggies had charge of a concession booth in the Stock Barns during the Fat Stock Show and Rodeo.


The group is raising money to send a judging team to Oklahoma City March 11-12.
