Gandy, Johnson Candidates For College Board

Loy Gandy, San Angelo businessman, and Jean S. Johnson, Veribest farmer and incumbent, have filed as candidates for the San Angelo College Board of Trustees. At the same time, Robert G. Carr, San Angelo oilman, philanthropist, and civic leader, announced he will not seek re-election April 2.

"My leaving the board certainly is not due to any friction," commented Carr at a regular meeting of trustees last night. "Serving has been one of the most pleasant experiences of my life. But it's time to let someone else serve for a while."

Like Trustees Johnson, Porter Henderson and R. R. Lowrance, Carr has been a member since the board was organized 10 years ago. Gandy, 52, is president of Gandy's Creamery, Inc., and he, too, is active in civic affairs.

In announcing his candidacy, Gandy said: "I realize that the college means so much to San Angelo. And anything I can do to help it I would be glad to do."

The terms of Henderson, Lowrance and W. D. (Bill) Taylor expire in two years and tenures of R. O. Sheffield and Bob H. Sharp run out in four years.

Henderson stated that the announcements of Gandy and Johnson were in keeping with the board policy to have both city and rural representation.

At this session, the board officially called the election for April 2, set the deadline for filing midnight March 23 and designated 24 voting places.

In unrelated matters, the board purchased \$7,915.42 worth of furniture for the new science building, awarding bids to four San Angelo firms and one Temple firm.

Purchase of chemistry, physics, and biology equipment as well as custodial material for the new building was authorized as well. The board accepted Scherz Nursery's offer of \$796.75 to landscape the grounds and deferred action on paving for a proposed parking area.

New Questionnaire To Get 'Try Out' At SAC Next Fall

A questionnaire which will test educational opportunities available to prospective teachers in Texas junior colleges will be "tried out" in San Angelo next fall.

The form, prepared by SAC and Texas Education Agency officials and designed to aid evaluation of teacher training standards in junior colleges, will be sent to schools throughout the state on April 15 for study.

Following checking of the SAC evaluation, the forms will be used in all other Texas junior colleges and results will be used to standardize teacher training, Dean Burl M. Abel said.

Board Discusses Parking Problem

San Angelo College's board of trustees met this week to review the college parking problem.

An area in front of the new agriculture-science building has been suggested by board chairman Porter Henderson as a new zone to be set aside for parking.

Currently, there is an area in front of the administration building clearly marked for faculty parking only. Some students persist in continuously showing disregard for the zoning by using this space for student parking.

The board considered plans for the forthcoming April 2 trustee election. The terms of Robert G. Carr and Jean Johnson expire this year.

DEAN ATTENDS TJCTA MEET

Dean Abel represented the Texas Association of Junior Colleges at the TJCTA meeting in Mineral Wells.

As vice president of the Administrative Association, he worked in conjunction with the TJCTA Executive Committee to plan a merger of the two associations so that a more closely organized and stronger unit may be formed.

The Executive Committee of the TJCTA will meet with the Administrative Association next April 14 to make the final plans for the merger. No meeting date for the TJCTA will be set until after the Administrative Association has met.

Asbury Park, N. J.—Undergraduate college girls between the ages of 17 and 24 years, are eligible to enter the third annual National College Queen Contest to be held at Convention Hall here over September 9-11, 1955. The contest is sponsored by the City of Asbury Park and free entry blank forms can now be obtained by writing to: College Queen Contest Director, Convention Hall, Asbury Park, N. J.

Mayor George A. Smock, 2nd, honorary chairman of the contest committee, announced that judging will be based on 50 percent for beauty and 50 percent for brains. Entry forms will request information concerning campus activities; extra-curricular achievements; scholastic work and personal background. Entrants will also submit an original essay (250 words or less) on the subject, "What College Education Means to Me." They will also submit photographs or snapshots along with entry blank forms and essays. The Youth Research Institute of New York City, has been commissioned as the official scoring and marking for the contest.

The purpose of the contest is to select and honor on a national level the typical and most all-around versatile college girl in

the nation. Three panels of nationally-known judges will select the 1955-56 National College Queen next September at the grand finals at Asbury Park. They will be headed by Clarence E. Lovejoy, internationally-known educational author and counselor; screen star Ida Lupino and world beauty authorities Ern Westmore and Bruno of Hollywood.

The National College Queen winner will receive the National College Queen Trophy Award; a Grand Tour of Europe with all expenses paid; scholarship awards and \$5,000 in prizes including an all-purpose wardrobe of designer's clothes. State college queen finalists will receive round trip transportation to compete at Asbury Park, N. J. and will be guests of the City of Asbury Park while there for the national grand finals.

College queen finalists representing the forty-eight states, Canada, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico, will be housed at leading beachfront hotels in Asbury Park under supervision of the Asbury Park University Womens Club whose membership will serve as official hostesses and companions to the competing finalists.

Gilmer-Aiken Achievements Are Listed

The Texas State Board of Education has adopted a report citing eight principal achievements under the Gilmer-Aikin school program.

This report is to be mailed to both San Angelo College and San Angelo High School officials, according to information received here from Austin. All Texas school officials will receive the report.

Dr. J. W. Edgar, state commissioner of education, said the report was compiled by the Texas Research League and is one step in evaluation of these achievements.

Second step will be the conferences of local citizens and school officials over the report.

The final step will be to make the results of the local and regional conferences available to all people in the state.

This report praised the Gilmer-Aiken system as having established a state administrative structure which provides "sound direction of public education."

Increased attendance, equalization of teacher's salaries, and improvement in the college training of classroom teachers were noted as marked improvements.

Women students at SAC are eligible to attend the 1955 summer session for Marine Corps Woman Officers to convene June 27 at Quantico, Va., Capt. Mary Sue Mock said today.

Capt. Mock, Marine officer representative of the southwest, currently is making a tour of colleges to inform students of the opportunity. She recently spoke to women students at Howard Payne College.

The officer training is for college women, including both students and graduates, the captain explained. It qualifies students for commissions as second lieutenants in the Marine Corps Reserve, and they are given an opportunity to apply for integration into the regular Marine Corps at a later date.

Present at the banquet were chapter members, ex-members, and other honorary society members.



guard, was a second team choice in the mythical selection. Horne played every major sport at Lohn High School and was a member of the Ram's football team last fall.



Nurses Type Blood In College Tests

Shannon Hospital student nurses attending San Angelo College recently ran a test on blood types, blood counts, and hemoglobin percentages of their group which they compared with a national average.

It was found that forty-two and eight-tenths percent of the 28 students had type O blood, forty-six and four-tenths percent owned type A, seven and one-tenth percent scored type B, and only three and five-tenths percent possessed type AB blood.

This is compared with the national average of Americans who show forty-five percent with type O, forty-two percent having type A, ten percent showing type B, and three percent owning type AB.

The Shannon average displayed 4,336,428 red cells over 7,424 white cells per cubic millimeter, to four and a half to five million red cells over seven hundred white cells for the national average.

Drapers Big Hit In Local Show


