

SAC EXES SCHEDULE VARIETY OF HOMECOMING EVENTS

The San Angelo College exes association has big doings scheduled for the SAC homecoming celebration tomorrow.

The festivities will start with a parade to begin at the Central Fire Station at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The parade will move down to Concho Street and then up to Chadbourne, continuing up Chadbourne to Beauregard. Mr. Forrest Harding and Mr. Ray Dorrance are in charge of parade activities for the exes association, and Delbert Tarter of the SAC faculty is parade marshal.

Immediately following the parade at three o'clock, a reception is being held at the Ram Room on the SAC campus. Mrs. Ed Keyes, vice president of the exes association, and Mrs. Bill Edgar, the organization's secretary-treasurer, are in charge of the reception. Mrs. Keyes and Mrs. Edgar are being assisted by Mrs. Merle Westerman.

The homecoming queen for 1955 will be crowned during the halftime activities of the SAC-Arlington football game at Bobcat Stadium tomorrow night at eight.

Immediately following the football game, the exes will hold their homecoming dance in the ballroom of the Cactus Hotel.

Mr. Ed Nunnally, president of the SAC exes association, stressed the fact that all San Angelo College students are invited to attend all of the functions throughout the day with the ex-students.

SAC Joins Nation In Commemorating UN

In accordance with a Proclamation issued by President Eisenhower, San Angelo was the scene of two special programs recently commemorating U. N. Week.

The first, presented at the regular assembly period in the college auditorium on Oct. 21, saw twenty-two persons representing eighteen foreign nations bring greetings to SAC students and other guests. Many of the representatives brought their greetings in their native languages. All now reside in or around San Angelo or attend San Angelo College. One guest, Mrs. Monica Langford, representing England, received her U. S. citizenship papers later the same day.

Miss Ann Albro, official good will ambassador from San Angelo to Finland, brought a report on that country.

In other entertainment, Misses Bonita Alexander and Beverly Skidmore presented a folk dance, and Mrs. Helen Kannellos, wife of Dr. Kannellos of Sanitorium sang "Visi Darte," from the opera "Tosca" by Puccini.

Countries represented on the program, presided over by Dr. Fraser, were Czechoslovakia, England, Austria, Singapore, Germany, Hungary, Iran, Japan, Ecuador, Mexico, Cuba, Guatemala, Virgin Islands, Spain, Greece, Puerto Rico, Poland, and Brazil.

In a brief ceremony on Oct. 24, the United Nations flag was raised at San Angelo College. Honoring the United Nations and its activities, the program took place at 7:50 a.m. under the flagpole. The Religious Council sponsored the ceremony with the Morning Devotional program. (Picture Page 6)

RAMS LEAD IN PIONEER LOOP

If statistics mean anything, the San Angelo College Rams, currently leading the title chase in the Pioneer Conference, are going to be mighty hard to handle in the top campaign just beginning. The Rams, with just over half their season's schedule completed, lead the conference in total offense, passing and defense; and they boast the circuits top passer. San Angelo in six games has a total of 1930 yards gained offensively, and average gain of 322 yards per game. In passing the Rams have completed a total of 130 pitches in 130 attempts for a gain of 958 yards and have had all opponents to a total gain of 1167 yards to lead the league extensively.

Skeet Williams, San Angelo's upper passer, leads all league quarterbacks with 31 completions in 57 throws for 523 yards; for an average of almost 18 yards per completion.

In other late Pioneer Conference news, Ranger Junior College defeated the defending conference champion, Tarleton, last Saturday night, 13 to 6; and the Arlington Rebels beat the Schreiner Mountaineers 32 to 20.

Thus, this week's homecoming game between the Rams and Arlington will probably decide the 1955 Pioneer Conference Championship; as San Angelo has already defeated Ranger 45-0, they would have little difficulty with Tarleton.

Young Hameister is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Aclin, and young Woods is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. Leon P. Woods, all of San Angelo.

Nancy Parks, SAC freshman, will understudy the role of Amahl. Singing the prize role of Amahl's mother will be L. V. Richardson and Mae Nell Northcutt, the part being divided with each performing one night only.

The three kings' roles will be sung by Jack Kirby, King Kaspar; Gene Willis, King Melchior; and Glen Landy, King Balthazar. The part of the page will be sung by Royce Dixon.

Briefly, the story is of a poor, crippled shepherd, Amahl, and his widowed mother. In Italy, where there is no Santa Claus; children receive their gifts from the Three Kings. Thus, on the night of Christ's birth, the Three Kings, in search of the Christ child, stop at Amahl's mother's house and ask lodging for the evening.

Student's Association Constitution Shows Revisions In Article V

Preamble

We the students of San Angelo College in order to form a better Student Government, do establish and adopt this constitution.

Article I

The Students' Association

Section 1. Students' Association—This organization shall be known as the Students' Association of San Angelo College.

Article II

Legislative Department

Section 1. Assignment of Legislative Power—All legislative power shall be vested in a Student Council provided that the students reserve the power to initiate legislation as hereinafter provided.

Section 2. The Student Council shall consist of a representative from each organized club, sorority, fraternity and other departmental organizations recognized by the San Angelo administration provided such organization is not subsidized by operational funds.

Section 3. Powers of the Student Council—The Student Council shall have the power to determine the qualifications of its own members; to expel by two-thirds vote of the Student Council and for proper cause, these members. It shall also have the power to remove from their positions any persons appointed by the Student Council, to appropriate all funds of the Students' Association any proposed amendment to this constitution, and to enact by-laws and rules necessary for conducting business.

Section 4. Oath of Office—Members of the Student Council and the several officers of the Students' Association shall take an oath of office as prescribed in the by-laws, before entering upon their duties.

Section 5. Meetings—The Student Council shall hold bi-monthly meetings at a time specified by vote of its members, and shall hold called meetings upon the recommendation of the President of the Students' Association.

Section 6. Quorum—A majority of the Student Council and at least one faculty advisor shall constitute a quorum thereof for transacting business.

Section 7. Right of Initiative and Referendum—The right of initiative and referendum may be exercised upon petition of 30% of the Students' Association. The right of recall may be exercised upon petition of 30% of the members of the Students' Association, provided that the petitioners shall have voted in the election being recalled.

Article III

Executive Department

Section 1. General Officers—The general officers of the Students' Association shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Reporter, who shall be elected at large by the members of the Students' Association.

These officers shall be elected by the Students' Association according to Article IV and in the manner prescribed in Article VII, Section VII.

Section 2. Duties of the President—It shall be the duty of the President to preside over all meetings of the Student Council, to appoint all committees necessary for carrying on the work of the Student Council, to prepare an agenda for all Council meetings, to strive at all time to promote harmony throughout the school, to vote in the Council only in case of a tie, to appoint officers until vacancies can be filled by the Student Council or elected by the Students' Association as the case may be, and to sign all warrants drawing funds from the activity fund.

Section 3. Duties of the Secretary—It shall be the duty of the Secretary to check the roll at each meeting of the Student Council; to keep a record of all proceedings of the Council meetings and to read the same from a book of minutes at each meeting of the Council; to furnish the President with a list of all members, committees, or representatives who have special duties to perform or reports to make; to do the correspondence for the Council not otherwise provided for; to give notice of special meetings of the Council, and to prepare a permanent record of all Council proceedings prior to the termination of office.

Section 4. Duties of the Treasurer—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to work with the Business Manager of the College in allocating Student Association funds, to make reports on expenditures from the student activity fund at regular meetings of the Council, and to compile a full report of expenditures from the student activity fund for the Council on or before the twentieth of May of each year.

Section 5. Duties of the Vice President—It shall be the duty of the Vice President to preside at all meetings in the absence of the President; to preside as chairman of the Social Committee; to carry out plans and instructions of the Student Council; to post notices of all elections to be held; to appoint the necessary officials for holding elections; to receive and post returns of such elections; to take charge of all written suggestions, plans or complaints made by the student body and to dispose of such matters as ordered by the Council; and to name, with the approval of the Council, the following permanent committees:

1. Student Reviewing Committee to work with the Faculty Discipline Committee—This committee shall consist of the two dormitory representatives and two additional members of the Student Council living outside the dormitories. This committee

shall comply with the rules set forth in Article VII, Section 3.

2. Recreational Room Committee—This committee shall comply with the rules set forth in Article VII, Section 3.

3. Publicity Committee—This committee shall have as its chairman the reporter of the Student Council and shall be in accordance with Article VII, Section 3.

4. Social Committee—This committee shall have as its chairman the Vice President of the Student Council and shall be in accordance with Article VII, Section 3.

Article IV

Elections and Appointments

Section 1. Election of the Student Council—The members of the Student Council shall be elected by their respective organizations on or before October 7 of the fall term.

Section 2. Election of General Officers—The applications of candidates for the various general offices shall consist of petitions signed by twenty (20) or more voting members of the student association. These petitions shall be presented on or before October 7 to the registrar's office for approval as to qualifications set forth in Article VII, Section 1. The official ballot shall be comprised of those students meeting the qualifications of this section with the election to be held one week following the closing date for filing petitions.

Section 3. Installation of Council Members and General Officers—All duly elected council members and officers shall be installed on the Wednesday following the election.

Section 4. Vacancy in Elective Offices—In case of the removal of the President for any reason whatsoever, the Vice President shall succeed him to office until the end of the existing term. A member of the Student Council shall be elected by the Council to fill the vacancy of the Vice President or any other of its general officers until the end of the existing term.

Section 5. Faculty Advisors—The Administration of San Angelo College shall appoint two members of the faculty to serve with the Student Council as advisors.

Section 6. Major Offices—No student of San Angelo College may, at one time, hold more than one of the following offices to be known as Major Offices:

President of the Students' Association
President of the Sophomore Class
President of the Freshman Class
Vice President of the Students' Association
Editor of the Ram Page
Editor of the Rambouillet
Secretary of the Students' Association
Treasurer of the Students' Association

Section 7. Election of Cheerleaders—There shall be elected five regular cheerleaders, two students from each class and a boy elected at large. Two alternates shall be chosen from those candidates receiving the next highest votes on the ballot.

The uniforms shall be bought from the floating fund.

The President of the Students' Association shall be responsible for the care of the uniforms while they are not in use.

Article V

General Provisions

Section 1. By-Laws—By-Laws shall be appended to this Constitution to clarify the articles of this constitution. By-Laws may be amended by two-thirds of the Student Council.

Section 2. Activity Fee—Each student shall pay a student activity fee of \$7.50 a semester to be apportioned among the various student activities by the Student Council, such apportionment to be made for the ensuing year at the first regular meeting of the Student Council.

It is further provided that the President of San Angelo College shall have power to excuse any student from payment of student activity fee when such student shall certify upon his or her honor that he or she is unable to pay same. It is further provided that the Student Council shall fix a price fee, or charge for every school party, dance, picnic, celebration or other function, or for receipt of school publications, the cost of which is paid from the student activity fund and that the Vice President shall see that any student who has not paid his student activity fee shall pay the

amount fixed by the Council before attending or participating in such activities.

Section 3. Apportionment of Funds—The funds of the student activity fee shall be apportioned among the following:

Athletics
Socials and Recreational Room
Ram Page
Rambouillet
Fine Arts Series
Dramatics
Band and Chorus
Floating Fund*

*The Floating Fund shall consist of not less than ten percent of the total activity fees collected during a given year.

Section 4. Report of Expenditures—All beneficiaries of the student activity fee shall on or before the fifteenth day of May of each year, make a written report of their receipts and expenditures for the current year to the Treasurer of the Students' Association. The Treasurer of the Students' Association shall compile all reports of expenditures and present them to the Student Council on or before the twentieth day of May of each year.

Section 5. Authorization of Expenditures—No money collected from the student activity fee shall be paid out by the Auditor of San Angelo College except as specified in the By-Laws.

Section 6. Social Calendar Committee—There shall be a committee of three persons, to be known as the Social Calendar Committee, consisting of the President of the Students' Association, the Vice President, and a member of the faculty to be appointed by the President of the College. This committee shall have charge of arrangements for the time and place of all social events given by any student or organization of students, application shall be made to the Social Calendar Committee at least seven (7) calendar days before the day on which the event is to be held, and the Committee shall have the power to approve or reject such application.

Section 7. Bills and Amendments—Bills or constitutional amendments may be originated in the form of a petition signed by at least twenty (20) percent of the members of the Students' Association. Bills initiated by members of the Student Council at its next regular meeting. Should the Council fail to pass the bill or amendment it shall be considered void and cannot be presented to the Council again during the same semester. Should the Council approve the bill or amendment it shall be referred to a vote by the Students' Association for a referendum seven (7) or more days following the decision of the Council.

Section 8. Vote on Amendments—Any proposed amendments to the constitution, upon receiving a two-thirds majority vote of the ballots cast, shall become binding and a part of the constitution.

Section 9. Student Publications—The Students' Association shall publish a newspaper and a yearbook, to be known as the Ram Page and Rambouillet respectively.

Section 10. Board of Publications—There shall be a Board of Publications which shall consist of the Editor and Business Manager of the Ram Page, the Editor and Business Manager of the Rambouillet, the President of the Students' Association, and the faculty sponsor of each of the student publications appointed by the President of the College. This board shall have general advisory supervision of all student publications and shall cause to be made to the Student Council, not later than the last regular meeting of each semester, a comprehensive report covering the business of the semester. This report shall immediately thereafter be published in the Ram Page.

Article VI Amendments

Article VII

Section 1. Qualification of Members—It shall be required of the Council and such Major Officers as mentioned in the Constitution to maintain a scholastic average of at least "C" to hold their offices. Averages shall be computed at the end of the previous semester.

Section 2. Oath of Office—I (repeat name) do hereby solemnly swear that as a duly elected officer of the Students' Association that I shall do my utmost to carry out all duties assigned to me by the Student Council. I shall at all

times endeavor to promote harmony and understanding throughout the school and shall strive to prove myself worthy of the honor which has been bestowed upon me.

Section 3. Duties of the Committees:

Publicity Committee
It shall be the duty of the Publicity Committee to give proper publicity to all Students' Association activities and to all activities which are supported by the student activity fund. It shall consist of not less than five nor more than seven members of which not more than three shall be freshmen.

Recreation Room Committee
It shall be the duty of the Recreation Room Committee to supervise all student activities taking place in the room or building designated for student recreation. The Recreation Committee shall have the authority to employ such additional help as is deemed necessary to maintain the cleanliness of said recreational facilities. The Recreation Room Committee shall consist of not less than five, and not more than seven students of which three shall be freshmen.

Social Committee
It shall be the duty of the Social Committee to make whatever plans or arrangements necessary for supervising or sponsoring all social events for the Students' Association. No fee may be charged members of the Students' Association attending any social event which is subsidized by the student activity fund, except in a state of emergency declared by the council.

Student Reviewing Committee
The Student Reviewing Committee shall consist of two dormitory representatives and two additional members of the Student Council not living in the dormitories who shall meet with the faculty. It shall be the duty of the Student Reviewing Committee to advise and assist in enforcing all rules, regulations, and orders of the Student Government and of the College.

The Board of Publications shall turn over to the college all funds.

Athletic Fund: Funds designated as athletic funds shall be turned over to the college.

Social and Recreation Fund: The Social Committee shall authorize all expenditures from this fund.

Requisitions must be approved by the Vice President, the Faculty Advisor, and the President of the Students' Association.

Art Series Fund: Funds designated as Art Series Funds shall be turned over to the College.

Dramatics Fund: Funds designated as Dramatics Funds shall be turned over to the College.

Band and Chorus Fund: Funds designated as Band and Chorus Funds shall be turned over to the College.

Section 5. After a Council member misses two consecutive regular meetings, his respective club shall be notified of his absences. If such representative fails to attend the next regular meeting, he shall be subject to removal from the Council by a two-thirds majority vote.

Section 6. Methods of Election—All constitutional elections shall be presided over by the Student Government. Each student voting must present his student activity card to be punched on the number designated by the Vice President. All ballots must be initiated by the presiding judge. Voting shall be by secret ballot and all ballots shall be kept by the faculty advisor of the Council for one year. A roll of voters must be kept and checked with the number of ballots. Counting of the ballots must be in the presence of one or more faculty members. All elections shall be by a majority vote. In the event that no candidate receives a majority, there shall be a run-off between the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes.

Section 7. Immediately following the election of the Student Council, the Dean of Students and the Business Manager shall counsel each officer as to his responsibilities and duties set forth in this constitution. Each officer shall be provided a copy of this constitution for study before the first regular meeting of the Council.

Don't Be One Of The Three Little Pigs

Why do we have reserve books? This may be a question of many new and old students in San Angelo College. All teachers place certain books on reserve so that all students in their particular class may have access to them. Unless books are placed on reserve, the first person who comes into the library will check the book out for two weeks. A person can see that the books would soon be exhausted in that particular course.

What are the rules pertaining to the library books on reserve? Reserve books are used for one hour in the library, after three o'clock during the week or eleven o'clock on Saturday. These books may be checked out for overnight or for the weekend. The librarian does make certain concessions, if possible, for people who work.

All reserve books are due the following hour or overnight books must be checked in at nine-ten the next morning.

Yes, there is a penalty if a book comes in late. Five cents an hour or forty cents a day is charged for each reserve book overdue. Every Wednesday, students having overdue books are posted in the front hall of the main building. Fines are charged to one's library deposit in the business office. The reporter begs students to return books on time saying: "Get them back in so I may use them."

RAMS UPSET? DEL MAR 24-14, ROBERTS RUNS RAMPANT

The rejuvenated San Angelo College Rams played havoc with the annual Del Mar College homecoming this past weekend by lacing the Vikings 24-14 before approximately 10,000 disappointed fans.

The Vikings were previously undefeated, and held the number one rating in Texas Jr. College circles.

The Fabulous Roberts

Norman Roberts may have earned the title of "the most unforgettable Ram" in the eyes of many Corpus Christi fans by way of a spectacular pass catch on the Viking 35 yard line and an even more spectacular run to the goal line. The play originated from the Ram yard line. Charlie Martin faded back from his man under position, got good protection from the tough Ram line, and fired a perfect shot

to Roberts who was being closely contested on the Viking 35. Roberts made a fine catch and was hit immediately but not downed. He shook loose from one defender, stiff armed another, and with from two to three players hanging on most all the way Roberts fought his way to the end zone in a run that could only be described as fabulous.

Roberts, who formerly played fullback for Robert Lee High School, had still more to contribute to the cause. The Vikings had stopped a San Angelo goalward march by recovering a fumble on the 7-yard line early in the third quarter. Three running plays moved it out to the 11 and the Vikings were forced to punt. Roberts charged through to block it and Larry Dempsey recovered the ball in the end zone for a touchdown.

In the third quarter he faked a pitchout, broke over the middle and ran 65 yards before he was hauled down on the Viking 5-yard line. Aside from throwing one touchdown pass, he completed another aerial for noticeable gain, 36 yards to his favorite receiver for the night, Norman Roberts.

Tommy McAdams who accounted for 12 of the Rams 24 points started the scoring by intercepting a Del Mar pass and returning it 35 yards for a touchdown. McAdams demonstrated some very elusive running on this play before he crossed the double stripe.

Before the final gun had sounded, McAdams had added six more points to the Ram side of the scoreboard with three extra points and a field goal. The field goal, his second of the year, came from the 13 yard line from an angle. A difficult target, but "Toe" Tommy split the uprights.

Scoring at a Glance

First Quarter: McAdams intercepts Del Mar pass and returns it 35 yards. Rams lead 6-0. McAdams converts, Rams lead 7-0.

Rams Maul Ranger 45-0 In Loop Opener

After making a vow to beat the Rams, Ranger Jr. College's ripped up Rangers went home suffering from a 45-0 mauling handed them by the high spirited San Angelo College Rams who refused to believe this bit of cow pen philosophy.

The game, which was the Pioneer Conference opener for both teams was marred by 22 fumbles, the ejection of three Rocky Marciano type football players, and a total of 252 yards in penalties.

Red Hot Scott

Next to the referee, Kenneth Scott was the game's leading ball carrier with a net gain of 60 yards in nine tries, an average of 6.6 yards per assignment. The 165 lb. freshman fullback also contributed two touchdowns to the victory cause. The first of Scott's counters came in the third period on an 8 yard sortie off the right side, and his second six-pointer came on a one yard blast down the gut.

Nervous Rangers

The Rangers couldn't seem to move against an inspired Ram line and fumbled the first two times they handled the ball. The Rams capitalized on both breaks to build up a 12-0 lead with eight minutes still showing on the scoreboard clock in the first period.

On the first play following the kickoff, Robert Webb fell on a Ranger fumble on the 20 yard line and Charlie Martin engineered the Rams to paydirt in six plays. Using the forward pass as his striking weapon Martin tossed to Larry Dempsey for six yards, then to Norman Roberts for four and a first down on the 10 yard line. Three running plays put the ball on the 2, and from there Martin flipped to Roberts in the end zone for the initial score.

A minute later Sammy Garner pounced on another Ranger fumble, this time on the visitors 30 yard line. Walter Kidd carried to the 17 in two tries and Martin fought his way to the 14. Larry Dempsey made a spectacular grab of a Martin pass on the three to set up the Rams' second tally. Then Clyde McLean took over from this point and went over in two tries for the score.

Still in the first quarter, following a nice punt return by Wade Earl Turner, Skeet Williams passed to Tommy McAdams who worked his way into the clear and crossed the double-stripe on a play that covered 58 yards. McAdams then added the extra point and the Rams led 19-0.

Second Half

The Rams took the second half kickoff and marched for their fourth touchdown in just five plays. Williams passed to Dempsey for five yards, then made 17 yards himself on a run before pitching out to Scott who ran for 15 more.

Scott went wild again, getting 15 yards, moving the ball to the Ranger 14. Scott then carried to the eight, but Williams was thrown for a five yard loss. Then on the next play, Williams went over standing up on a keeper play around right end. Williams try for point was successful and the Rams were up there 26-0.

It was pointed out that students pay fees as well as tuition to be counted for state apportionment and that only one student would be affected by the change.

In passing, Dr. Cavness also reported that enrollment has climbed to 753 (about 200 of them night students), that \$1,776,540.15 has been invested in the college plant as of Oct. 19 and that estimated average monthly expenditure for salaries and operation is \$36,721.66, compared with last year's monthly average of \$32,892.86.



Being cured, Amahl insists on accompanying the Kings to Bethlehem to pay his homage to the infant Christ and the Three Kings graciously consent to watch out for him.

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
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
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
