Air Force Colonel Speaks On Future Of Today's Might

"The USAF—Today and Tomorrow" was the program theme when Col. Stephen P. Ham, Laughlin Air Force Base, Del Rio, spoke to the student body and faculty members yesterday morning, October 18, at the freshman orientation program.

An outstanding 1962 graduate of the USAF Air War College, Col. Ham was graduated from flying school in January, 1943 and was formerly a student of Col. Dean Davenport, one of General Doolittle's Tokyo Raiders.

Serves in Aleutians

During World War II, he served as a bomber pilot in the Aleutian Chain, and later as a B-29 instructor pilot and flight examiner in Texas. After the war, he participated in all-weather flight experiments leading to the development of techniques and equipment used in all-weather flying. He also participated in a cosmic ray research expedition under the auspices of the National Geographic Society.

In 1948, he transferred to England where he spent several years as a member of the staff of the RAF Flight School and also worked on the staff of the Air Ministry.

Holds Important Posts

Upon his return to this country, Ham continued his work with all-weather flight testing. In 1957, he was assigned to the 13th Air Force in the Philippines as a member of the Operations staff. His present assignment is Commander of the 3645th Pilot Training Group, Laughlin AFB, Texas.

Colonel Ham was born in Pulaski, Va., and is married to the former Peggy Watson of Newport News, Va.

Science Club Sees Hypnosis Display By Local Dentist

Dr. R. O. McWilliams, San Angelo, spoke to the Science Club October 16 on the subject of hypnosis in dentistry. He explained that hypnosis may be substituted for anesthesia in persons who are allergic to novocaine or it may be used with patients who show excessive fear in a doctor's office.

Dr. McWilliams demonstrated hypnosis by putting Hildgard Floyd, a student of nursing at SAC, in a light trance simply by talking to her after she had closed her eyes.

During the trance she was unable to feel any sensation of pain when the doctor applied considerable pressure on the skin of her hand.

Some Resist

While about 80 per cent of the population is susceptible to hypnosis, only 30 per cent are considered highly susceptible. Some individuals are resistant. This resistance is attributed to the following three situations:

First, persons who are afraid they will do something embarrassing while in a trance. These are persons who think of hypnosis as a "circus side-show act," not as a useful medical tool. Secondly, domineering persons whose temperament prevents close cooperation with the physician. And thirdly, a very young or old senile person whose powers of concentration is low.

Over 100 Attend

Attendance at this meeting of the Science Club was one of the largest in the last three years. About 100 persons were present.

Sponsors of the club are Mr. Glenn Casey, Mr. Reed W. Matthews, and Dr. Phillip Leverault. Meetings are held every first and third Thursday of each month.


Rodeo Club Rides In Recent Parade

The Marine Corps offers various courses for young men who are interested either in being a ground officer, aviator, or law officer. Students who are accepted for the aviation programs commence flight training at Pensacola, Fla., after completing summer training and graduation.
