Mrs. Smith Dies In Auto Accident

The flag was flown at half-mast for the death of Mrs. Malcolm (Woodie Dee) Smith, a business administration and secretarial science teacher at San Angelo College, who was killed in a two-vehicle accident near Mason at approximately 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, March 27.

Mrs. Smith was on her way to Taylor for the funeral services of A. K. McNeill, her brother-in-law, when the accident occurred on the Mason cut-off. She ran head-on into a pickup carrying two passengers. The driver was killed, but the other man was not too seriously hurt.

Besides Mr. McNeill and Mrs. Smith's deaths, two other members of the family died. Sigfrid V. Kreig, Mrs. Smith's sister's brother-in-law, accidentally shot himself Wednesday afternoon, March 27, at about 1:30 p.m., and the brother of Mr. McNeill died at the McNeill funeral.

Upon hearing of Mrs. Smith's death, Dr. R. M. Cavness, president of San Angelo College, praised Mrs. Smith as being a capable and personable teacher of the college for the past three years.

She is survived by her husband, Malcolm Smith, five sisters and two brothers.

The key to the benefits which are paid to workers who retire, die, or become disabled is the number on your social security card. Any person who cannot locate his or her card should take immediate steps to make application for a duplicate card by obtaining a form for this purpose at the nearest social security office or post office. The new social security card will have the same number originally assigned to the worker.

Following the memorial service, a spray of white carnations was placed on the front door of Main building, the college was closed for the rest of the day and a caravan of private cars and the two college station wagons were used to take many of the faculty staff and administration members and a few students to Breckenridge for the funeral.

In this group which left for Breckenridge was Porter Henderson, president of the board of trustees of San Angelo College.

Pres. Pays Tribute

At the college service Dr. Cavness paid tribute to Mrs. Smith as a teacher and friend of students. Dr. Richard Crews, minister of First Christian Church, gave a scripture reading and a religious message. Mrs. Smith attended First Christian Church.

An original poem, "In Memory of Mrs. Smith," written the day after her death by Charles Dickson, SAC student from San Angelo, was read by him as a representative of the student body. Hymns were sung with Ralph Masterson at the piano and Eldon Black directing the singing. Both are faculty members.

Prayer Closes Service

Sid B. Stevenson, dean of students, gave the invocation. The program closed with Black singing "The Lord's Prayer."

The San Angelo group which attended the funeral were guests at a special luncheon prepared by the women of First Christian Church of Breckenridge at Breckenridge.

DE Club Sponsors Film On Yearbook

A colored film, which was produced by Newsfoto of San Angelo and shown by Wish Redd, a staff member of Newsfoto, was shown to the Distributive Education Club of San Angelo College on Thursday, March 28 in the Science building. The college journalism students were guests of the DE club at the showing of the movie.

The film showed the entire process of the development of the yearbook from the time a kit is sent out to schools to the time the covers are glued on the books.

Mr. Redd then gave a brief talk on the history of Newsfoto and Taylor Publishing Company of which it is a member. Newsfoto is ranked third largest in the United States in publishing yearbooks.

Newsfoto publishes yearbooks for 12 states and has won 11 straight yearbook awards. Newsfoto has shown its progress. In 1962 they published 268 books while 330 yearbooks are being published this year. In 10 years they plan to be three times as large and publish 1,000 yearbooks per year.
