From a letter written in December, 1860:

"Great is the excitement in the State about politics. It is to be decided on the sixth of December, whether she will secede or not. I have gotten to be a great politician since I came here. I am in favor of secession, but not the kind the majority of Carolinians are - that is state action. I am in favor of co-operation, in other words, of forming a Southern Confederacy."

Another letter written to his father, December 17, 1860:

"The Convention met today. We have not heard what was done. Two of the students leave tomorrow, and others talk of going soon. They are leaving on account of this State seceding. President Patton gave us a lecture a few mornings ago in Chapel. He said he thought it would be useless for us to leave, but he was confident that the State would secede and that we would be in no better condition by going to Mississippi, Alabama or Florida for they would soon follow (there he was forced to stop by the applause from the Mississippi and Alabama students.)"
