H. S. Bright Rites Set Here Today

Henry S. Bright, 90, died at 12:15 a.m. Sunday in Sunny Dale Nursing Home after a long illness.

Funeral will be at 2 p.m. Monday from Elliott's Chapel of Memories with the Rev. Morgan Thompson, pastor of Elmwood Baptist Church, officiating. Burial will be in Content Cemetery south of Abilene.

Mr. Bright was born Dec. 18, 1876, in Benton, County, Oregon. He moved to Abilene with his family when Abilene was a year and a half old.

He lived here for a short time before moving to Content Community. The Bright family owned a general store there for 40 years. Mr. Bright retired in 1951, when he moved back to Abilene. He had extensive land holdings in the Content area.

He married Icy Cash near Quitman, Tex., in 1927. Mr. Bright attended school at Content and Waco Business College.

Survivors include his wife of the home, 734 Ross; a sister, Mrs. Carrie Dale of San Angelo; a niece, Mrs. William Baynes of San Antonio; a nephew, M. C. Dale of San Angelo.
